### KANSAS LEGISLATIVE INSIGHTS NEWSLETTER | MAY 1, 2020

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On Tuesday, April 28, Senate President Senator Susan Wagle announced her plan to reopen most Kansas businesses immediately at 50% capacity while retaining stay-at-home restrictions on assisted living and nursing home facilities. On Wednesday, April 29, Gov. Laura Kelly announced the emergency declaration would be extended until May 14. The declaration is necessary for Kansas to continue receiving federal funding. Gov. Kelly announced a new Executive Order on reopening Kansas would be unveiled on Thursday.

On Thursday evening, April 30, in a statewide television address, Gov. Kelly announced Executive Order 20-29 to implement phase one of her “Ad Astra: A Plan to Reopen Kansas,” which starts on May 4. Many businesses will be able to reopen following social distancing guidelines. Kansas would gradually reopen in two-week increments with phase two starting May 18 and phase three starting June 1. The current stay-at-home order is due to expire on May 3. A complete lifting of many of the statewide restrictions could occur by June 15. The Republican leadership in the House and Senate advanced several questions about the plan and indicated a preference that restrictions on all businesses be lifted sooner.

The March total tax collections were \$523.4 million, or 1.6% below the October estimate. As expected, the Kansas Department of Revenue April Kansas-only revenue numbers dropped sharply by \$612 million, or 50% below last April. April is the first full month reflecting the pandemic’s impact on Kansas tax revenue due to rising unemployment and the struggling Kansas economy. The total April revenue was \$574 million, which was dramatically impacted by tax deferral until July 15 and high unemployment. The good news is the numbers were very close to the Consensus Revenue Estimating Group estimates from April 20.

Next week, the Legislative Coordinating Council will meet to determine when the Legislature will reconvene.
